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This outline covers the requirements for completion of **Level 1** training for KRDP Community Radio volunteers who are interested in becoming producers of short-form content for the station, such as promos, public service announcements, interviews, and news pieces. **LEVEL 1** is a two-day intensive course covering the skills needed to record, edit, mix, and normalize audio pieces for broadcast.
